Air Fresheners - Guidance Document





According to the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), <u>A Guide to Indoor Air Quality (epa.gov)</u>, air fresheners constantly release chemicals into the air and present an indoor air quality (IAQ) issue for sensitive populations. Some of these chemicals, known as volatile organic compounds or VOCs, easily evaporate at room temperature and can cause headaches, irritation and trigger allergies/asthma. Rather than purifying the air, air fresheners 'mask' or hide odors by adding more chemical pollutants to the indoor air.

MCPS prohibits the use of chemical products that have not been reviewed and approved for use in MCPS facilities, including "do-it-yourself" air fresheners, readily available in a variety of retail markets. If there are concerns about any types of odors, staff members are encouraged to complete the MCPS Indoor Air Quality Complaint Form (MCPS Form 230-23). Staff will investigate and identify the root cause that needs correction.
